NOTE FROM PASTOR LOGAN

April 2025

Dear Members and Friends,

WOW! Rolling thunder that went on, and on, and on! Flashes of lightning that made the night sky alive and electric and even brighter than daylight! Powerful winds that blew so strong they could remove anything that simply stood in their way! My goodness gracious, what a night! I'm not only recalling the storm we encountered a few nights ago, when sirens told us to seek secure places for our own safety and well-being, I'm also thinking about what happened when that stone was rolled away from the tomb where Jesus lay, and salvation was secured for all.

The 28th chapter of Matthew's gospel tells us it was like this: After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. ²And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. ³His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. ⁴For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. ⁵But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified.

Holy Week and Easter are coming soon, and the joy of our salvation and Jesus' resurrection glory become even more meaningful when we are enveloped in the depths of the love expressed by God through the sacrificial offering made for all of creation by Jesus Christ on Calvary's cross. The deep, deep darkness of Good Friday is indeed wiped out and totally overcome by the glorious details of the events of resurrection morning. Tony Campolo left us this message:

Remember, "It's only Friday... but Sunday's coming!"

"It's Friday... Jesus was nailed dead on a cross.

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!"

It's Friday... Mary's crying her eyes out 'cause her Jesus is dead.

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!

It's Friday... The disciples are running around like sheep without a shepherd.

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!

It's Friday... Pilate's strutting around washing his hands 'cause he thinks he's got all the power and victory.

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!

It's Friday... People are saying "as things have been so they shall be – you can't change anything in this world."

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!

It's Friday... Satan's doing a jig saying, "I control the whole world."

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!

It's Friday... The temple veil ripped from top to bottom -the earth shook- the rocks split and tombs opened. The centurion screamed in fear, "Truly, He is the Son of God!"

But it's only Friday; Sunday's coming!

It's Sunday- "The angel, like dazzling lightening, rolled the stone away exclaiming, "He is not here! He is risen!"

It's Sunday! It's Sunday! It is Sunday!"

Unfortunately, too many of us know the deep, lingering, all-encompassing darkness of Good Friday. Life circumstances of frail health, failing relationships, and other challenging events can be devastating and take the life right out of us. Yet, even more of us have understood what it means to be resurrected to new life! Through the miraculous goodness of God's grace and mercy, through the support of loved ones in and beyond our faith community, because of the intentional efforts of people – some known to us and others known only to God – people who have demonstrated their faithfulness and love, we have overcome. We are able to live anew as resurrected people who enjoy new beginnings and now express our passion and gratitude each and every day we are given.

This year, please invite your family members, friends, neighbors, roommates, co-workers, fellow volunteers, anyone you can, to join us in our Holy Week worship services, which allow us to more completely embrace and comprehend God's love for all of creation. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on April 13, when we will share the complete Passion of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We will hold worship services on Maundy Thursday, April 17th, at 7:00 pm with a focus of Jesus' example of loving God and loving neighbor, by serving in humble, even lowly ways. Good Friday is on April 18th, and our 7:30 pm worship service of scriptures and song lead us into the dark night of Jesus' death on Calvary's cross. Then, It's Sunday!!! Our festival celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord is April 20th. All are welcomed to join in simple songs and prayers at 7:30 am Easter Sunrise at the outdoor cross. We will share breakfast at 9:00 am, then, our Festival Celebration of the Resurrection worship with outstanding music and a moving message begins at 10:00 am. Come, and bring someone you love with you, because this changes absolutely everything!

First, the council would like to share with everyone that May 11 will be the official day celebrating Pastor Logan's retirement. Lara Haines has graciously volunteered to head up a committee which is currently in the process of planning some special events and hospitality for that day. More details will be shared as the event draws nearer. I hope to see the pews packed. Please invite anyone you would like, and if you have contact with former congregation members feel free to reach out and invite them to come.

There is not much new to share on the process of hiring a new pastor. In the short term we will begin scheduling supply pastors through the summer. The synod will meet with council and eventually we will be assigned an interim pastor. That will last until we are able to find a permanent pastor. A call committee will be established sometime in the next few months, it and our synod will lead us through this process. Please be aware and be patient as this entire process can take over a year.

Finally, barring any unforseen setbacks, construction on our new pipe organ will begin in mid June or early July. I am anxious to hear it played. It has been a long time coming.

May God bless you all in this Lenten season. Easter is coming.

PASTORAL NEXT STEPS

At the Congregational Meeting in late January, several people asked the Church Council about the process for searching for our next pastor and whether it could be expedited. As I promised, I reached out to the Assistant to the Bishop, Rev. Bob Abrams, for some help in understanding the process. Council has subsequently asked me to continue as a liaison with the Southern Ohio Synod as we begin this search, and I have outlined the process below.

First and foremost, it is important that we attend to Pastor Dysart's needs as he transitions to retirement. Council has been working with Pastor to outline the plans for the next few months as he concludes his 25 year service to our congregation. To that end, Laura Haines has kindly volunteered to head a committee to plan a special service and hospitality after worship services on May 11. Details will be shared as they become available. Please plan to attend on that date to honor Pastor and invite guests to attend with you as well.

The subsequent ministerial leadership of Faith Lutheran Church can then be viewed in three phases:

- **Short-term** In the weeks immediately after Logan's retirement, our congregation will be served by supply pastors. This phase may last anywhere from 2-8 weeks, depending on the scheduling of the next phase. Annie Caudill has taken the responsibility for scheduling supply pastors. Since supply pastors will be responsible only for Sunday worship, other responsibilities may need to be picked up by members of the Church Council as necessary.
- Medium-term The Bishop is already having conversations with potential Interim Pastors who will serve Faith Lutheran in the medium-term. An Interim Pastor will be selected by the Bishop and approved by our Church Council for what is typically a six-month term, which can be renewed until a replacement pastor is selected. The Interim Pastor's contract will be negotiated between our Church Council and the Bishop. During this time (and starting around the fall of 2025), a Call Committee will be formed (as outlined in our Church Constitution) to gather information for our Ministry Site Profile (our "church's CV"), so that we can make some decisions about who and what we are looking for (e.g., Do we need a full-time or a part-time pastor?).

Long-term — Once we have decided on a Ministry Site Profile, the Call Committee will work with the Synod to begin the search for our next pastor. This process usually takes 1-2 years.

If you have questions about this process, feel free to talk with me or anyone on Church Council.

PIPE ORGAN FACTS "OUR JOURNEY CONTINUES"

I think there is a light at the end of the tunnel; and it is not an oncoming train!! Work has resumed on the organ console that is in South Carolina with delivery projected in mid-summer. Let's all pray that this holds.

NOW FOR SOME PIPE ORGAN STUFF

- 1. Pipe organs have many ranks of pipes of differing pitch, timbre, and volume.
- 2. They are the largest instrument in the world played by a single person.
- 3. Pipe organs were the most complex machine created before the Industrial Revolution.
- 4. They were banned in Soviet-controlled Europe because they were a symbol of the church and monarchy.
- 5. Each pipe sits on top of a hollow wind chest filled with compressed air, and each 'stop' at the organ console represents a set of pipes of a particular tone color.

Bishop Eaton Issues Video Message for Transgender Day of Visibility

CHICAGO (March 31, 2025) — ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has issued a video message for Transgender Day of Visibility. In the video, Eaton speaks out against the inhumane actions by legislatures and executive orders while also speaking directly to the transgender and nonbinary community.

"God created you in God's image and loves and cares for you exactly as you are. ... You deserve to be safe in our communities. Bullying and discrimination have no place in the body of Christ," Eaton said.

E.L.C. A PRAYER VENTURES APRIL 2025

- 1. Pray for lasting peace between nations and for the healing of people who suffer conflict, war and violence, especially in Ukraine, Russia, Gaza, Israel, Syria, Haiti, Myanmar and regions of Africa.
- **2.** Arab American Heritage Month Give thanks for the contributions and impact of Arab Americans in every aspect of society, including religion, education, science, business, government and the arts. Ask God to bless and further the work of ELCA Arab and Middle Eastern Ministries and the Association of Lutherans of Arab and Middle Eastern Heritage.
- **3.** "You have come down to the lakeshore seeking neither the wise nor the wealthy, but only asking for me to follow" (*WOV* 784). Praise God for seeking us out and, despite our imperfection, making us humble disciples, equipped and inspired by the Spirit.
- **4.** Pray for church leaders, liturgists, scholars and scientists gathering to discuss including the Feast of Creation Day in liturgical calendars, an effort organized by the Roman Catholic Church in partnership with the Lutheran World Federation, World Council of Churches, World Methodist Council, Anglican Communion and World Communion of Reformed Churches. Ask the Spirit to guide their study and discussion of climate justice, the Nicene Creed, the role of the Holy Trinity in creation, and how Christians engage with the creation story.
- **5.** Remember in prayer worship leaders and musicians participating in the ecumenical Music that Makes Community workshop in Waco, Texas, a day of building community through singing, learning and fellowship.
- **6.** Pray for a spirit of humble generosity that recognizes and encourages the diverse gifts and contributions of our siblings in Christ, who give as they are able and are inspired by their gratitude towards and love for God.
- 7. Praise the Creator for the new life of an emerging spring, which inspires our joy, awe and hope.
- **8.** There are about 390,000 people in foster care in our country, ranging from infants to young adults. Pray that these young people will experience love, understanding, security and encouragement in their foster families. Give thanks for foster parents and remember those young adults who, aging out of foster care, may face new uncertainties.
- **9.** Seek God's forgiveness and mercy for the times when we have hurt, offended or demeaned others, intentionally or unintentionally. Pray for the Spirit to grant us humility, penitent hearts and a compassion that stirs us to make amends and heal broken relationships.
- 10. Lift up in prayer farmers, ranchers and agricultural workers. Give thanks for their efforts to feed the world and care for creation, and pray for abundant harvests.
- 11. Give thanks that God is always doing something new in and through us, wonderful things that impact others when they witness Christ's awesome love reflected in our lives as disciples.
- 12. Pray for youth in our congregations and communities, recognizing the challenges they face, celebrating the joys they experience and showing gratitude for what they add to our faith communities, which need the gifts of *all* generations to do God's work in the world.
- **13.** *Palm Sunday* Pray that we might accompany Jesus in his journey of persecution, suffering, death and resurrection, a journey of love and sacrifice for our sake.
- 14. Pledge to bear hope, grace and newness in Christ to our neighbors in need, especially those who are poor, hungry, sick, imprisoned, unemployed or plagued by war or domestic conflict.
- 15. Praise God for the strength we draw from Scripture, from our siblings in Christ, from living in community and from the tireless work of the ever-present Spirit.

- 16. Pray to the Lord for comfort, strength and renewed faith when you feel broken and worn-out.
- 17. Maunday Thursday Today we end our observation of Lent and shift our attention to what God has done for the world through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, son of God and son of humankind. Give thanks for the gift of new life in Christ, a life wrapped in God's boundless grace.
- **18.** *Good Friday* "Start being brave about everything. Drive out darkness and spread light. Don't look at your weaknesses. Realize instead that in Christ crucified you can do everything" (Catherine of Siena, 1347-1380). Pray for the Spirit to strengthen our faith so that, through us, God's love and mercy might shine brightly in the world.
- 19. Ask the Spirit for a faith that is certain and resilient, even when we don't fully understand or appreciate what God has done for humanity through Jesus Christ.
- **20.** Easter Day Sing praise and thanksgiving to God! This is the day the Lord has made for us to gather as loved and forgiven children, celebrating our freedom from the bondage of sin and death.
- 21. When you reflect on who might need your presence, comfort and reassuring words of love and hope, who comes to mind? Include them in your prayers and reach out to them.
- 22. Give thanks and pray for directors for evangelical mission, who serve in partnership with ELCA churchwide ministries and synods, helping them to found "new start" ministries, renew congregations, nurture stewardship, and identify, develop and equip leaders for ministry.
- 23. Every day, Jesus walks with us, sharing good news and wisdom just as he did with Cleopas and his companion on the road to Emmaus. Pray that the Spirit will help us express that good news and wisdom in our conversations with our neighbors.
- **24.** "We are not fed by only doing one way of ministry. Instead it is about seeing the face of God in every person who walks through the door, about embracing the inherent dignity of every individual, regardless of their circumstances" (the Rev. Esther K. Sianipar, "Serving With Shobi's Table: A Reflection," **shobistable.org**). Pray for our neighbors who suffer hunger, lack reliable access to nutritious food and yearn for the support of caring communities, and thank God for our congregational, synodical and churchwide ministries that serve them without bias or judgment.
- **25.** Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Alaska Synod, Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod and Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- **26.** Thank God for the spiritual nourishment we receive when we gather around the table to celebrate communion, and for the Triune God, who calls and equips us to do God's work in the world.
- 27. Like the apostle Thomas, we all experience moments of doubt and disbelief. Pray that God will be patient and forgiving with us, rekindling our trust in a Spirit that helps us when our faith weakens.
- 28. Thank God for volunteers who respond to the needs of the church and society by sharing their time, gifts and passion. Pray that we will extend to people of all ages the invitation to serve God.
- 29. Pray for those who suffer the trauma of gun violence in their communities and elsewhere. Ask for wisdom in responding to our stricken neighbors, for guidance in working to ending gun violence and for fearless respect for human life a precious gift from God, our creator.
- **30.** Again, we rejoice and shout, "Hallelujah! The Lord, our savior, is risen!" The good news and power of Easter that we experience cannot be confined to a single calendar day.

We stand united as people of faith in our commitments to welcome the stranger and to care for the most vulnerable – commitments rooted in our common understanding of our Creator's love for all and call to serve our neighbors.

In these overlapping holy days of Purim, Lent, and Ramadan, we join our voices together to express our grave concern for the individuals and families seeking refuge in this country. We are particularly devastated and concerned for the welfare of the thousands of refugees who were approved and even ready for travel, only to have their plane tickets taken away.

For more than four decades, our faith-rooted organizations have partnered with the US government to ensure that people forced to flee their country because of conflict, violence, or persecution are vetted and arrive legally, to be welcomed in this country with services to meet their basic needs.

The recent US State Department termination of cooperative agreements with the 10 national resettlement agencies in the US has made already-at-risk people even more vulnerable. We urge all people of faith and goodwill to join us in advocating with our elected leaders for our partnerships with the government to be restored so that we can fully work with those we are called to serve.

We invite you to join us in prayer for all people who are forced to flee home. May they know our deep and abiding commitment to their lives and well-being.




